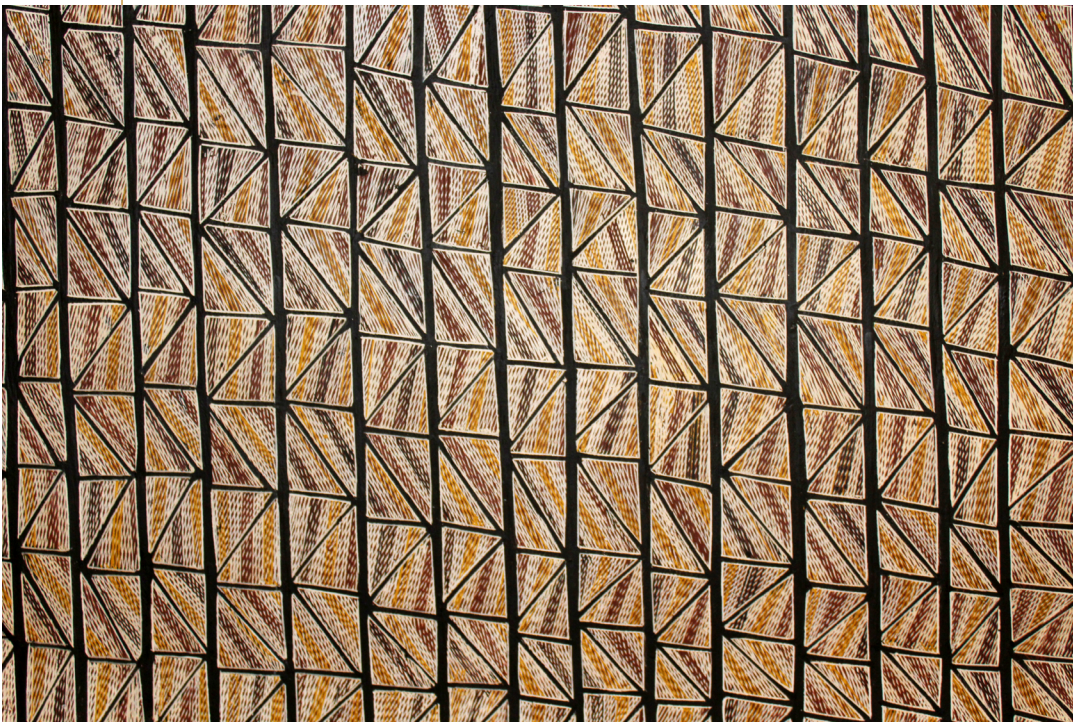

philosophies and unique ways of being that have sustained this fragile place for millennia. Our scholarship is steeped in critical theory and is trans- and inter-disciplinary.

Career opportunities

The United Nations estimates that there are over 370 million Indigenous people living in over 70 countries worldwide. A knowledge of Indigenous cultures, histories, languages, politics, development aspirations and representation is increasingly vital for careers both domestically and internationally: in the private sector (banking, law, industry, business), public sector (state, territory, Commonwealth and local governments), Indigenous sector (native title bodies, land councils, community organisations) and in non-government, not-for-profit and charitable organisations.

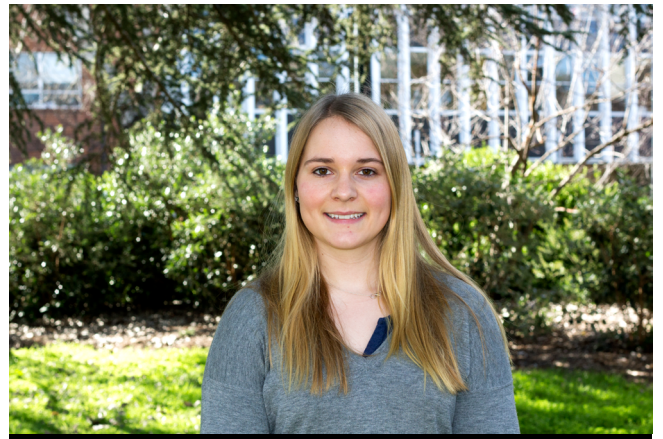
Australian Indigenous Studies courses are taught by academics from many schools and other Indigenous knowledge holders from diverse communities. The major grounds and then facilitates respectful and critical engagement with First Peoples' knowledges and creates the opportunity for positive lifelong learning and relationship-building, and constructive engagement with national challenges in this space. Course content is diverse and fascinating, including:

- Country, kinship and continuities
- Resilience, rights and resurgence
- Indigenous occupation, adaptation and management of land and sea
- Indigenous prosperities and economies
- Indigenous socio-cultural, ceremonial, artistic and linguistic practices, past and present
- Critical Indigenous Studies
- Impacts of European colonisation
- Histories of relationships and encounters between First Peoples and settler-colonisers
- Politics, law, and policy
- Identity, representation, equity, and authority.

ANU offers the opportunity to undertake Indigenous studies as an undergraduate major or minor. We not only teach on Kambri campus. We also teach at our stunning coastal campus on Yuin Country and take our students on field schools, and create opportunities to learn with senior and respected knowledge holders.

Australian Indigenous Studies was the most enjoyable and interesting part of my Arts degree at ANU. I began Indigenous Studies in my second year with a mix of anthropology, archaeology and history courses. The subjects cover Indigenous culture and society, both historical and contemporary. The most attractive aspect is the experience and knowledge you gain across a number of disciplines, from music and art to history and linguistics. This variety exposes you to a number of different perspectives on Indigenous studies, allowing you to come away with a more rounded understanding of Indigenous people, their culture and history. I also enjoyed the opportunity to learn from an Indigenous lecturer and from researchers who are leaders in their fields.

Australian Indigenous Studies has ignited my desire to continue further study in Indigenous affairs and opened up opportunities to volunteer with organisations that work with Indigenous Australians. It has made me appreciate the culture and history of Indigenous people and has inspired me to work in this field once I graduate — whether it is working with Indigenous people face-to-face with an NGO, or working on policy through a government department.
