The program provides in-depth study of geopolitically significant regions including the Levant, North Africa, the Persian Gulf, Turkey, and Central Asia.

- engage critically with key scholarly debates and controversies related to the study of the Middle
 East and/or Central Asia, including those that cross traditional disciplinary boundaries.
- apply theoretical and critical knowledge of the region to assess the dynamics that shape and influence Middle East and/or Central Asia, including one or more of: the roles of key actors in these regions' politics, international relations, and political economies; the impacts on the region of modern historical events; and the impacts of societal and cultural forces
- communicate the findings of your study of the Middle East and/or Central Asia clearly and succinctly, both in writing and orally.

Cognate disciplines

Diplomacy, International relations, Modern history; Other social sciences and humanities disciplines and fields where there is significant coverage of a relevant aspect of Middle Eastern, Central Asian or Islamic Studies and where similar approaches and methodologies are used; and modern languages relating to the Middle East and/ or Central Asia region such as Arabic, Persian, Turkish, Russian or French.
