



# Demography



The study of Demography is essential to understanding and shaping the world around us.

#### About studying Demography

Demography is about how populations change across space and time. Demographers study not only the size and composition of populations, but also what factors lead to a changing population.

You will study population dynamics with a focus on demographic processes such as birth, migration, partnering, and death which are core processes of the development of culture, society, nation states as well as families and individual life courses. Demography is also concerned with the interactions between people and the natural and built environment. Future cohorts of population analysts will improve the capacity for population policy research, and contribute to health and social issue professions, market research, government departments, international agencies and any organisation which needs to understand our changing world.

The study of Demography also facilitates interdisciplinary learning, which is critical for understanding complex problems. It provides an avenue for collaboration and exchange of knowledge between academic disciplines at ANU, including for example, sociology, political science and international relations, history, indigenous studies, anthropology, law, economics, geography, health, environmental sciences and statistics.

#### **Career Opportunities**

Demographers study population change and its cause and effects. Their knowledge is sought after by many organisations. As such, career opportunities are often within, or for government and public service departments, as well as international NPOs and NGOs where high quality population information is needed for policymaking.

Demographic skills acquired through population research and analytics equip graduates with an understanding of population issues and policies. These competitive skills make better-trained specialists for the health and social care professions, insurance and superannuation professions and many other agencies that require a sound social analytical basis for decision-making.

### Professional Outcomes

Our graduates have pursued a range of successful careers in both the public and private sector, succeeding in careers in places such as the Australian Public Service, the United Nations, the financial sector, and at leading universities around the world.
