The Centre for Arab and Islamic Studies is Australia's premier location for studies in this field, with a high international standing and links with its major counterparts in the Arab and Muslim world, as well as in North America and Europe.

Study in small groups with country experts and gain a deep regional grounding from multiple interdisciplinary perspectives, including contemporary politics, international relations, modern history, political economy, development studies, sociology, and religious and cultural studies. The degree includes intensive options for busy professionals, and online options for those based remotely, alongside traditional face-to-face seminars with leading global experts on the Middle East and Central Asia.

Career opportunities

Career prospects for graduates with a background in Arab and Islamic Studies include opportunities in the public service, diplomacy, journalism, business and trade, both in Australia and overseas.

Language specialists are in strong demand specifically in government departments dealing with immigration and ethnic affairs, foreign affairs, customs and excise, social welfare, health, consumer affairs, and the media.

Professional outcomes

- cultural and regional expertise
- diplomacy and communication
- research and analytics
- language and linguistics
- problem solving.

- Other social sciences and humanities disciplines and fields where there is significant coverage of a relevant aspect of Middle Eastern, Central Asian or Islamic Studies and where similar approaches and methodologies are used
- Modern languages relating to the Middle East and/or Central Asia region such as Arabic, Persian, Turkish* or Russian.

Courses

The exact structure of the program is flexible and students have the opportunity to study a range of courses such as:

- Dynamics of Israeli-Palestinian Conflict
- Islamic Radicalism
- The Gulf Strategic Environment
- Authoritarianism, Democratisation and Protest in the Muslim Middle East
- Middle Eastern Economies
- Geopolitics of Central Asia
- Islam in World Politics
- Turkish Politics and Foreign Policy
- Drivers of Violent Extremism: The Local and the Global in the Middle East
- Issues of Development in the Middle East
- Energy and Security in Central Asia and the Caucasus
- Turkish History: Ottoman State to Modern Turkey
- Islamic Economies in Practice

Language studies

Students may also take courses in three of the region's languages. Languages offered are:

- Arabic
- Persian
- Turkish

Each of these languages is associated with a rich historical and cultural legacy. Each is also a dynamic contemporary language, with large populations of speakers throughout the regions of the Centre's coverage.
