
About studying Philosophy

Philosophy addresses a range of fundamental questions about the world around us and about the human condition. For example, What is the nature of space and time? What is knowledge? How do brains give rise to minds? How does language shape thought? What is the role of science and technology in our lives? Why should we be good people, and what should we do to make a just society?

Career opportunities

Studying philosophy is intrinsically fascinating and engaging, but it is the skills that philosophy graduates develop in criticism, evaluating argument, critical thinking, and presenting cases for and against positions that make philosophy graduates particularly prized by employers.

In Australia, philosophy graduates secure jobs that compare very well to graduates in other subjects, including vocational subjects. Philosophy majors are regularly among the highest scoring groups in postgraduate aptitude tests in the USA such as the LSAT (Law School Admissions Test).

Philosophy at ANU

The School of Philosophy has strengths in a variety of areas including philosophy of mind, epistemology, philosophy of science (particularly philosophy of biology), moral theory, and political philosophy. Courses offered by the School of Philosophy represent contemporary Anglo-American philosophy, contemporary European philosophy, and Asian Philosophy. Philosophy students learn to:

- Critically evaluate arguments for and against controversial positions, and they gain the ability to carefully formulate and defend their own arguments for views they endorse
- Carefully engage with both classic and contemporary philosophy texts, honing interpretive skills and skills in critically evaluating arguments
- Engage with a wide range of important and fundamental issues across a range of the most interesting and most fundamental questions that we face.
